

2025 LIBRARY IMPROVEMENT AND ANA SUMMER SEMINAR GRANTS

IT'S TIME TO SEND IN YOUR ENTRY FORMS!

Each year, the TNA issues Grants to two qualifying members to cover the cost to attend the ANA Summer Seminar. TNA also funds five \$125 reimbursement Grants to qualifying members to purchase books and material to improve their numismatic libraries.

Individuals (not clubs) who have been members for two years (and are non-winners for two years) are eligible to enter the drawing for one of two grants to cover transportation, room and board, and tuition at the 2025 ANA Summer Seminar in Colorado Springs.

Individuals and clubs who have been members for two years (and are non-winners for two years) are eligible to enter the drawing for one of five grants of up to \$125 to improve the member's numismatic library.

Entries will be drawn first for the Summer Seminar and then for the Library Improvement Grants. A member may only win one grant per year. The drawing will be held in early 2025.

IN REMEMBRANCE

From TNA President Rick Ewing: We are saddened to share the news of the passing of longtime TNA Member **Jerry Foctman**. He was a strong collector of fractional currency and knew all the nuances of almost all the issues. He displayed them regularly at both the TNA Convention and Greater Houston Money Show.

From Former ANA President Ralph Ross: Paul Edmund Garner was a cherished member of several coin clubs including the Texas Numismatic Association (TNA), Greater Houston Coin Club (GHCC), and American Numismatic Association (ANA). He was know as "the man whose typewriter took him around the world". He retired from the U. S. Air Force as a typist serving in Vietnam, Philippines and other parts of the World. He enjoyed reading books and collecting world coins and was known for his "Vest Pocket Coins". His passing left a void in the numismatic community and we are deeply saddened by his departure. Paul dedicated himself to nurturing the next generation of numismatists, particularly through his involvement with the Clements Coin Club (C-Cubed), the renowned world's largest high school coin club in Sugar Land, Texas. His tireless efforts

as a chaperon for countless students and his role in organizing educational field trips across Texas were instrumental in shaping the knowledge and passion of young numismatists (YN's). Paul Garner's believe in numismatics education and his legacy continues to inspire and enrich the numismatic world.

From Former TNA President Richard Laster: I first met Paul Garner back some decades ago when he was present at local shows as a self-professed "vest-pocket" dealer. If I recall correctly in those days, he would wear a vest to emphasize the point. My memories of Paul include his extensive and diverse numismatic knowledge. He spoke of his extensive numismatic library. He loved books. Paul served the Texas Numismatic Association as a district governor and as one who would volunteer in the role of educator, a practice I was able to see first-hand. He also coordinated a variety of small, regional, coin shows, including one with Numismatics International. His first carrier was in the Air Force, from which he "retired" in 1975. After moving, for work purposes, to Waco, he was a consistent presence at events throughout the state.

MOZAMBIQUE 1000 ESCUDOS Jack Gilbert, NETCC

The 1000 Escudos notes for Mozambique were produced under the Portuguese Administration for 1964-1967. In 1970 the oversight of such notes was taken over by Banco Nacional Ultramarino, Lisbon, Portugal. Two types of 1000 Escudos notes were dated 1972.

Pick #112a (Lisboa, 16 DE MAIO DE 1972) and 1972 (Second Issue) Pick #115 (Lisboa, 23 DE MAIO DE 1972)





The notes were printed by De La Rue (Thomas de la Rue; Thomas De La Rue & Co.; TDLR), London, United Kingdom (1821-date). Mozambique succeeded in achieving independence on June 25, 1975, after a civil resistance movement known as the Carnation Revolution, ending 470 years of Portuguese colonial rule in the East African region. Shortly after that, in 1976, 50, 100, 500 and 1000 Escudos notes of the Banco Nacional Ultramarino were overprinted with the name of the new issuing bank, the Banco de Moçambique. The overprinted note is designated Pick #119. The uncirculated Pick #115 is listed at \$120, while the overprinted #119 is only \$6.





This Pick #119 is the one that I recently acquired, partly because I thought the overprint was interesting and worth researching. Just as important, however, is the fact that the back of the note featured two pilots in an open cockpit airplane. These aviators that this note depicts are Gago Coutinho and Sacadura Cabral on board the seaplane Lusitânia during the first aerial crossing of the South Atlantic Ocean between Lisbon, Portugal and Rio de Janeiro, Brazil in 1922, 50 years before the original printing of this note in 1972.

2016 UNITED KINGDOM 50P PETER RABBIT COIN

In 2016, the Royal Mint minted the first Peter Rabbit coin as part of a series of coins to celebrate the famous children's book author Beatrix Potter. The reverse of the fifty pence coin shows Peter Rabbit looking straight ahead, wearing his iconic jacket, and stroking his chin with his paw. His ears are pointed straight up, and his whiskers are sticking out. The image comes from another Beatrix Potter story, The Tale of Benjamin Bunny. The picture that is shown was an original drawing by Beatrix Potter but was redesigned to go on the coin by Emma Noble, a coin designer at the Royal Mint.

Like all the other coins that are in the collection, the first Peter Rabbit coin has on its obverse the last definitive coinage portrait of Queen Elizabeth II, which was made by Jody Clark and first used in 2015. It has the legend "Elizabeth II D[ei] G[ratia] Reg[ina] Fid[ei] Def[ensor]" which means "by the grace of God, Queen, Defender of the Faith." The composition of the coin is a cupro-nickel alloy, made up of 75% copper and 25% nickel. The weight of the coin is eight grams, and the diameter of the coin is 27.30 millimeters.

The appearance of the first Peter Rabbit coin was the first time that a character from a children's book had been on any UK coin. The Royal Mint produced 9.7 million of the first Peter Rabbit coin, because it was a circulating coin like the others in the collection. However, they also minted 15,000 silver proof coins in a limited-edition presentation. These coins, unlike the circulating ones, were color-printed.

Beatrix Potter was born in 1866 in London. Beatrix was the first child of Rupert and Helen Potter. Her parents were very strict. As a child, Beatrix was not allowed to be seen or heard. Growing up in the 1870s, girls were not allowed to go to school after elementary school. Beatrix had a tutor, though, so that she would get an education. Beatrix was very lonely until her brother Bertram was born in 1872. They loved playing together and having fun. Some of Beatrix's hobbies were painting, sketching, and writing!

In 1893, Annie (Beatrix's best friend) told her that Noel, Annie's child, who was only six years old, was very sick. Beatrix could not visit the Moores. She wrote Noel a letter instead. She did not know what to write, so she decided to tell stories about rabbits named Flopsy, Mopsy, Cottontail, and Peter. The rabbits lived with a mother in a sand bank. Beatrix's letters also had drawings of the four rabbits, their mother, and Mr. McGregor, who was a mean farmer. Beatrix didn't know it. but she had created what would be the most famous rabbits in the world. Beatrix didn't want Noel's siblings to feel left out. So she wrote more letters to Noel's siblings, like one about a frog named Mr. Jeremy Fisher. Annie told Beatrix that her children were very happy with her silly stories and sketches in her letters. Over time, Annie and her husband Edwin had eight children. Beatrix wrote more letters about Squirrel Nutkin, Little Pig Robinson, and the Tailor of Gloucester. Annie Moore loved the special letters. She put them somewhere safe.

Beatrix started turning her letters into books. She asked Annie if she could borrow the letters, and Annie of course said yes. Beatrix started writing the books in small sketchbooks. First, she made the Tale of Peter Rabbit. It was first published in 1902. It has been translated into more than 30 languages and sold over 150 million copies. She sent the book to publishers and had 250 copies of the Tale of Peter Rabbit printed. It was a hit, so she had to make 200 more copies. Everyone loved the mischievous Peter Rabbit. Beatrix was surprised. Even Beatrix's parents were proud of her.





A team of editors said that Beatrix's drawings would be much better in color. Beatrix did not want to change her black-and-white drawings. She was worried that color drawings would cost way too much to print. Norman Warne, an editor, convinced Beatrice to change her mind, and she did. She also got engaged to Norman, but one month later he died of leukemia. Beatrix went on to publish 23 books in total, from 1902 to 1930.

In October 1905, Beatrix settled in a place called Hill Top Farm. It was in a village in the Lake District in northwest England. England's highest mountain and long, deep lakes are in this rural area. Finally, Beatrix found someone to marry: a lawyer named William Heelis, in 1913. They never had children, but Beatrix is now a famous woman who had a good life. She passed away in 1943. She left all of her property to the National Trust, and thousands of people enjoy visiting her property every year.



CIVIL WAR TOKENS

Civil war tokens were privately minted starting in the early days of the civil war. They were accepted as currency because there was a shortage of government issued cents. Also, a contributing factor was Americans had begun hoarding coins with gold and silver making it hard for businesses to operate, which lead to private minting of these tokens. Many were manufactured by the Scovil Manufacturing company in Waterbury, CT.

One popular token was the "Dix" token getting its name from Secretary of the Treasury James Dix. As the Civil War was about to erupt, Dix sent a message to Treasury Agents in Louisiana with the message, "If anyone attempts to haul down the American Flag, shoot him on the spot", which became the quote on the reverse of the Dix tokens. The obverse has a US flag surrounded by 13 stars, "the flag of the Union."

In April 1864 a law outlawing these tokens was enacted, and in June of 1864, a law outlawed ALL private coinage. Civil war tokens were minted between 1861 and 1864. It is estimated that there were about 25 million tokens in circulation. Most had a value of one cent and there were about 8,000 varieties.

Civil war token collectors are a small group of people as compared to US coin collectors. Many of these collectors look for varieties with errors on them. An example on the Dix token says, "shoot him on the spoot," instead of on the "spot." Another example which is sometimes overlooked, is on the patriotic Army/Navy token. It looks normal but the reverse says, "the federal union must and shall by preserved." It should say "be preserved." In the last few years, civil war tokens prices have been creeping up and the trend is expected to continue.











ISRAELI 10,000 SHEQALIM NOTE Charlie Tate, Dallas Coin Club YN

From 1984 to 1985, the Bank of Israel issued the first—and, so far, only—10,000 sheqalim note. On the note, Golda Meir, one of the prime ministers of Israel, makes an appearance. This large denomination banknote is evidence of the massive inflation that took place in Israel at the time. This article will explain why inflation was rampant in Israel and how Israel eventually overcame the problem.

For many years, Israel was frustrated with the unoriginality of their currency, the Lira. The Lira happened to be the currency of many other countries, like Italy and Turkey. In 1980, Israel got the chance to replace the Lira with the sheqel, an ancient coin used by their ancestors. Originally, the sheqel was minted in denominations from a one agora coin (equivalent to 1/100 of a sheqel) to a 1/2 sheqel coin, and banknotes were issued in denominations from a one sheqel note to a 100 sheqalim note.

The early 1980s were dominated by inflation, and almost every country had a very high inflation rate. But what set Israel apart was that, in Israel, the inflation did not stop. The Bank of Israel had to introduce several new denominations of currency. By 1984, the Bank was issuing 100 sheqalim coins, and 10,000 sheqalim notes. The economic problems faced by Israel in the early 1980s necessitated annual changes in the country's coinage and paper money. These problems continued until the first sheqel series was abandoned in 1985 and replaced with the new sheqel.

In 1980, Israel minted the first series of coins using the new sheqel currency. The four denominations were 1 agora, 5 agorot, 10 agorot, and 1/2 sheqel.

The 1 agora and 5 agorot coins were both made of aluminum, while the 10 agorot was made of bronze and the 1/2 sheqel was made of a copper-nickel alloy. Other than the 1/2 sheqel, which was minted by the Swiss mint in Bern, all of the new coins were minted by the Royal Canadian Mint in Ottawa.

Persistent high inflation made changes in the denominations necessary. Sheqel coins were increased in denomination. And as the denomination of the coins and notes increased, smaller denominations were omitted. The 10,000 sheqalim note was issued at the highwater mark of the inflation.

In 1985, just after inflation reached its peak of 445%, Israel enacted extreme

policies that counteracted the inflation. Moreover, in the same year, Israel also switched their currency again to a new agora and sheqel. These measures started returning the Israeli economy back to an acceptable inflation rate of 1.3%. These actions were known as the "Economic Stabilization Plan." This plan was a concoction of the new Prime Minister, Shimon Peres. Some have argued that his work may have saved Israel's future entirely.

The story of Israel's economy in the 1980s and the 10,000 sheqalim banknote demonstrates the effects the economic situation of a country has on the currency the country produces.

WILLY BRANDT - FORMER CHANCELLOR OF WEST GERMANY - NOBLE PEACE LAUREATE

Willy Brandt was born in 1913 in the city of Luebeck Kingdom of Germany. Brandt joined the socialist youth movement in 1930, then Weimar Germany. He was influenced by his working-class environment. He was a gifted student; however, his life took an abrupt change when the Nazis took power in 1933. Due to his socialist activities, he became in conflict with the Gestapo and had to flee to Norway to escape arrest. In Norway, after changing his name, he worked as a journalist. In 1936 he spent six months working for the underground movement in Berlin, since he was able to pass as a Norwegian student.

In 1940 during the Nazi occupation of Norway, he was taken prisoner. Brandt was able to flee to Sweden and remained there for the duration of the war. While in Sweden he helped victims of the Nazis.

Having lost his German citizenship, he returned to West Germany as a Norwegian citizen. He found work with Scandinavian newspapers and as press attaché at the Norwegian military mission in West Berlin. Brandt began working in German politics after regaining his German citizenship. In 1949 he was elected to the West German Federal Parliament for the Social Democratic Party and in 1957 he became mayor of West Berlin. In 1963 Brandt met with John F. Kennedy in West Berlin when he gave his famous "Ich bin ein Berliner" speech. Contrary to the urban myth that Kennedy said in German that he was a "donut", he correctly said "I am a Berliner" to cheers and applause of the West Berliners. In 1969 Brandt became Chancellor of West Germany. In 1970 on a visit to Poland, to the surprise of everyone, Brandt kneeled

at the memorial of the Warsaw Ghetto victims.

Brandt worked to improve relations with East Germany, the Soviet Union, and other Eastern European countries with his policy of "Ost Politik" or "East Politics." Willy Brandt resigned as Chancellor in 1974, assuming responsibility when a close aide was discovered to be an East German spy. Brandt regarded the fall of the Berlin Wall, and a free and united Germany as the fulfillment of his political life. He died on October 8, 1992. Willy Brandt was winner of the 1971 Nobel Prize for Peace. His fight against the Nazis and aid to their victims, is just one example of the many Germans who were not Nazis or complicit in the Holocaust.

The Royal Norwegian Mint honored Willy Brandt with this .925 silver 1 troy ounce medal in 1999. The medal shows Brandt's face on the obverse with "1913-1992" and "Chancellor of West Germany" in English and German. On the reverse is "Honoured with The Nobel Peace Prize 1971" in English.

FAO MONEY AND MEDALS PROGRAM 30TH ANNIVERSARY (1968-1998) MEDAL

In 2,500 years of monetary history, FAO coins constituted the first international issuance with a common theme: *Food for All*. In 1968 the FAO Money and Medal Program was launched, using national coinage in a unique, educational way to stress explicitly the need for increased food production. The hope was that through these coins, FAO and is mission to eradicate hunger and poverty will be brought to the attention of the widest possible public.

WHO WAS THAT MASKED MAN?

From my western token and medals collection, I chose four examples of one of the most famous mythical characters in a television series of the old west. Although he wore a mask, he and his companion fought for law and order in those early days of the western frontier. These champions of justice were early role models for a multitude of young fans, both boys and girls.

In the 1950s, youngsters and their parents gathered around the television set to see their favorite western sixgun hero in action. The announcer's opening lines were "A fiery horse with the speed of light, a cloud of dust and a hearty, 'Hi Yo Silver'! The Lone Ranger!" and continued with the dialog ending with "Return with us now to those thrilling days of yesteryear. The Lone Ranger rides again!" The background music was the exciting "William Tell Overture."

Clayton Moore portrayed the role of The Lone Ranger. Jay Silverheels played his companion Tonto. The television series began in 1949 through 1951, and then it returned in 1954 through 1957. Due to a contract dispute, Moore's contract was not renewed in 1952 and another actor, John Hart, played the Lone Ranger for two seasons, 1952 through 1953.

Moore completed a total of 169 episodes of The Lone Ranger television series, and he was featured in two full-length films, "The Lone Ranger" (1956) and "The Lone Ranger and The Lost City of Gold "(1958). In 1987 he was honored with a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame. In 1990 he was inducted into the prestigious National Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City and was awarded the coveted Golden Boot Award twice.

Clayton Moore died of a heart attack on December 28, 1999, and is buried at Forest Lawn Cemetery in Southern California. I was fortunate to meet Clayton Moore on several separate occasions when he was touring and signing autographs for his fans. I also met two other actors in San Antonio who played the masked man. They were John Hart and Armie Hammer who is the latest actor to play the legendary six-gun western hero.

Clayton Moore will always be remembered by his fans as the most memorable Lone Ranger who rode his gallant white horse, Silver.

JOVITA IDAR QUARTER


At first glance on the obverse, this could be mistaken for a medal. It appears the information usually on the obverse of U.S. quarters is missing. However, the artist placed it, and much more, on the blouse worn by Jovita Idar. It takes very strong magnification to read everything. "Quarter Dollar" can be seen on her right arm and shoulder. "E Pluribus Unum, United States of America" is around her left arm. All the other words represent some aspects of her life that the artist thought were important. "Mexican American Rights" is written on the high neckline of the blouse. The other words include the following: Jovita Idar, Teacher, Nurse, La Cruz Blanca, Journalist, El Heraldo Cristiano, El Progresso, La Cronica, La Liga Feminil Mexicaista, and Astrea. The Greek Goddess of Justice was Astrea and was Jovita Idar's nickname. She was born in Laredo, Texas in 1885 and died in San Antonio, Texas in 1946.

TEXAS INDEPENDENCE SESQUICENTENNIAL MEDAL

While helping a friend with his coin collection, I came across this very interesting medal composed of 99% silver. This medal was minted to celebrate Texas' sesquicentennial anniversary, 1836-1986.



In 1834, Santa Anna dissolved the constitution of 1824, the Mexican Congress and the federal system, and declared himself the absolute dictator. Mexican forces were sent to enforce Mexican laws and collect taxes. A Texas war party took up arms and on October 2, 1835, and the first shot was fired at Gonzales. The settlers won the first victory as the Mexicans withdrew. The forts at Goliad and the Alamo fell to the Texans, and by the end of 1835 not a single Mexican soldier was on Texas soil.

Santa Anna led an army across the Rio Grande in early 1836 and laid siege to the Alamo in San Antonio. After 13 days the Alamo fell. Colonel Travis, David Crockett and James Bowie were killed along with most of the defenders. While the Alamo was under siege, a convention met at Washington on the Brazos and on March 2nd adopted a Declaration of Independence from Mexico. During continued hostilities, 342 Texas prisoners were massacred at Goliad on March 27th. General Sam Houston on April 21st defeated and captured Santa Anna in the Battle of San Jacinto. Texans had fought, died and won their independence.

This medal honors those who fought and died for Texas' independence and celebrates the first 150 years of Texas.

All they have to do is learn a little about coins, apply that knowledge to earn club bucks, and use those club bucks in the live auction. In the end, kids leave with a little more knowledge

and some collectible coins that would make any seasoned numismatist jealous. Of note, Jackie Morgan-Tomko noticed before the auction started, 50 chairs would not be enough seating so additional rows were quickly added to ensure every child had a seat. For anyone who has ever tried to run an educational program, it's good to see the youth interested in numismatics. As a last-minute surprise, Club Member Don Seale donated a 2023 Morgan Silver dollar to be part of a drawing for all kids in attendance. Each kid received a ticket, and the lucky winner received the coin. Don Seale later said, "When the winning ticket was announced, that child must have jumped 3 feet into the air. If we don't inspire these kids now, what will happen to coin collectors in the future?"

Educational Exhibits

Educational exhibits were also available to be viewed by the public. For those who do not know, exhibiting is an important part of any coin show. Exhibits show the public that coin collecting is as limitless as the imagination and it is a way to educate what it is to collect. Exhibit chairman, John Grost, came up with an ingenious way to get people to vote on exhibits. Ballots were handed out at the main entrance to the show and voters were told that two lucky people would be selected at random to win an ounce of silver via random ballot drawing. This worked better than anticipated. John had the luxury to sort out almost 200 ballots filling a 5-gallon bucket to the brim. This too was another El Paso first, as it took John a few days to sort all ballots in both the main exhibit category and the mini-exhibit category.

For those who have never heard of a mini-exhibit, this is another unique part of the El Paso Coin Show. Several years ago, John Grost came up with the idea to split a display case into four sections and allow members to display one item that he or she thought was

special. This provided a way for many exhibitors to share coin collecting with the public and exhibit without having to use seven or more cases to talk about a subject. This is a great way to include club members who may not have the ability to do a large exhibit (thank you John G).

Fundraising Raffle

There was also a fundraising raffle ticket program where anyone could make a \$1 donation and receive a ticket to win a Numismatic prize. There were several silver and gold prizes available, but the grand prize was a \$500 bill donated by David Chan of El Paso Coin and collectibles. The fundraising program was so successful, 6,000 tickets were sold. The number of tickets would have been higher but by Sunday opening day, there were only 75 tickets left. This is also a first for the International Coin Club of El Paso, Inc. (Thank you for your contribution, David Chan).

Special Recognition

Arizona coin dealer and ICCOEP Life Member Peter Spooner received a special Ambassador 2024 award plaque for promoting El Paso, Texas as a Numismatic destination. Peter Spooner has been a participant at our show for many years and he always promotes the ICCOEP as he is also a member. Commemorative Medal

The International Coin Club of El Paso medals program was a great attraction in itself. Every year since 2006 the International Coin Club of El Paso, Inc. has commissioned a new medal commemorating some aspect of El Paso history. This year, Hueco Tanks was selected. The design was created by Bettie Elwell. For those who are unaware of the significance of Hueco Tanks, it is a special historical site for El Paso / Texas as it contains the largest collection of ancient painted masks in all of North America. It was a gathering place for many different peoples from ancient man to the modern day and is considered holy to many First Nation peoples. Hollow pits in the granite rocks (huecos) hold water from the rainy seasons thus carrying life-sustainable water resources over into the dry season. Upon visiting this site, you quickly realize nature is all around you. Walking through these boulders, you no longer feel like you are in a desert basin, but rather an oasis. Animal tracks are easily spotted in the mud, birds fly overhead, and during periods of heavy rain small freshwater shrimp can be seen swimming within some of the hueco pits. These boulders also provide shelter for various plant and wildlife species as it is full of small caves and overhangs. Some of these integral aspects were incorporated into this year's medal. Above the rock formations, there is an image of one of the painted masks from a location known as Cave Kiva.

As a tribute to the individual who

discovered masks within this cave. the initials WMH are hidden within the right horn of the painted mask. These initials are of a man named William Mack Hill, who was leading a Boy Scout troop in the 1950's at Hueco Tanks. Although the discovery was not formally reported for another 20 years, his discovery was reported in an official packet that was submitted to the State of Texas to designate Hueco Tanks as not only a historic site but also a State Park. William Mack Hill died in his early 40's, thus never knowing the extent of his great findings. By telling this story through the International Coin Club of El Paso, Inc. medals program, we are hopeful that more people will learn the importance of this discovery. Questions for Dr. Coyne

- 1) Is this piece a U.S. Mint coin?
- 2) Was wood pulp ever used as an ingredient in U.S. paper money?
- 3) What was the first use of the motto "We Are One" on an American coin?
- 4) Is acetone safe to use on coins?
- 5) How much weight does a coin lose in circulation?
- 6) What is a "wire rim" and how does it occur?
- 7) What is a "railroad rim" and how does it occur?

1) Is this piece a U.S. Mint coin?

The "1804" Large Cent shown at left is a concoction made outside the mint about 1860 by private parties. An obverse die for 1803 Large Cents was found among discarded trash (or metal sold for scrap). The date on the die was changed to "1804" as that is a rare date. A similarly discarded reverse die from 1820 was paired with the

reworked obverse (now broken, causing the circular mark that easily differentiates these coins from their genuine counterparts). Additionally, the design of the reverse in 1820 was similar but not the same as the open wreath design used in 1804. It was impossible to remove the rust pits in the devices of the discarded die, giving the coins a pitted appearance. An unknown quantity of restrikes was made and sold to collectors. This piece, and a similar "1823" cent have become legitimate collectibles.





The 1804 restrike obverse (above) and reverse (left) is a PCGS graded MS-65 BN example, sold by Heritage Auctions for \$2,300 in 2009. The reverse pictured at right is a genuine 1804 example, graded by PCGS at AU-55 and sold for \$80,500 in 2010.

2) Was wood pulp ever used as an ingredient in U.S. paper money?

U.S. currency has generally been made from a mixture of linen and cotton rag for the 100+ years that Crane Paper Company (in Dalton, Massachusetts) has been the supplier to the Bureau of Printing and Engraving. Some experiments have been made with other materials, but wood pulp has never been a major ingredient. The properties leading to strength and long life of the paper in our notes is attributed to the absence of wood pulp. Wood pulp is the primary ingredient in newsprint and other common papers.

3) What was the first use of the motto "We Are One" on an American coin?

The "We Are One" motto appeared on the Continental Currency dollar-sized pieces dated 1776. These pieces come in pewter (pictured), silver, and a copper-based alloy. The intended denomination remains uncertain.

A similar design was used in 1787 on the Fugio coppers. The Latin "E Pluribus Unum" expresses the same idea and has been used on a larger number of issues than the English version.

4) Is acetone safe to use on coins?

Acetone (also known as dimethyl ketone) has been successfully used on coins to remove greasy dirt and PVC residue from improper storage. It does not remove metal (like thiourea acid). Acetone does not remove toning, and it can improve luster, if there were surface contaminants which the solvent removed. Acetone is quite volatile (and explosive in high concentrations), and it is not safe to breathe, so it should always be used in a well-ventilated area. In any application in which acetone will work, its chemical cousin methyl ethyl ketone will also work. MEK is a little less volatile and safer to use. As always, cleaning coins you intend to have graded is not advised (even with non-abrasive methods), but a little acetone to clean off the "slime" from a common coin you've had in an old PVC holder since you were a child is a good application.


5) How much weight does a coin lose in circulation? The 1841 Seated Liberty Dollar shown has been worn

down to AG-3 condition, according to PCGS. The rims on the reverse are worn into the lettering. Perhaps surprisingly, the coin has only lost about 4% of its birth weight. For dimes through half dollars, buyers of "junk silver" of pre-1965 issue typically use .715 pure ounces per dollar of face value. They are protecting themselves from buying bags of nearly worn-out coins where they might find circulation abrasion to total 7% or so on the worst coins. Uncirculated pre-1965 U.S. dimes, quarters, and halves were minted with .723 ounces of pure silver per dollar of face value. Naturally, small

coins like dimes have more surface area compared to volume than do large coins. Even for dimes, Dr. Coyne thinks that at 8% loss there would be no design left at all; a slick.

6) What is a "wire rim" and how does it occur?

A wire rim is the result of an unintended error in setting up the coining press or in the making of one or both coinage dies. It gets its name from the "wire" or "fin" that is formed along the edge of the coin at the moment of striking when metal flows between the face of the collar die and the edge of the obverse or reverse die under high pressure. If the striking pressure is right, and the collar closely fits the obverse/reverse dies, no wire rim forms. The \$20 St. Gaudens gold pieces are the most famous coins to commonly come with wire rims. At the time, the "wire rim" effect was seen as a defect in the minting process, and Mint Director Frank Leach resolved the issue by adjusting the dimensions and angle of the planchets to ensure appropriate containment of the metal at the edge.



7) What is a "railroad rim" and how does it occur?

A railroad rim is a type of striking error. It occurs when a planchet fails to fully enter the collar surrounding the coining chamber in the press. The part of the planchet outside the collar (usually above it) is not constrained by the collar and remains unstruck as the obverse, reverse, and edge designs are impressed. The coin is thus a bit oversized, and the profile of the edge looks something like a railroad track with the smooth "rail" offset by the incomplete reeding, or "railroad ties."

They were primarily issued from 1914-1924. The Reichsbank eventually declared the mark to be valueless and ceased all issuance. The Notgeld was replaced with the new Rentenmark. The new mark was not backed by gold but a mortgage on the entire industrial and agricultural resources of the country. Each member received a piece of Notgeld donated by Chuck after the presentation. The mintmark for the coin is below the ribbon. Millions of Morgan dollars were melted and converted into bullion to help the British in India. The 1921 dollars look different than the pre-1904 coins because the original hubs were destroyed in 1910. The Morgan is one of the most popular coins in all of Numismatics. Fourrée coins are coins that are made of a base metal material such as brass or even wood and then dipped in a precious metal such as silver or gold to make to make them look like their more expensive counterparts. 

THE MOST BEAUTIFUL COIN CONTEST

FROM STEVE MCFARLAND, COLLIN COUNTY COIN CLUB

This is a contest modeled after the NCAA Basketball Brackets ("March Madness") that is extremely popular. It is designed to get Coin Club members talking in an open environment about their favorite coins, and hopefully get some people who might be reluctant to produce a whole program about coins to participate in a Coin Club program.

Step 1: Open Ballot at a club meeting where members get to vote on their favorite ("most beautiful") 3 coins. The results will be tabulated with 4 pts. for any coin that receives a 1st place ballot, 2 pts. for 2nd place, and 1 pt. for 3rd place. ALSO – on the ballot – the members can check a box indicating that they will present for that coin (they can volunteer for multiple coins, but they will only present for 1 coin). The member running the program tabulates the results and establishes the top 8 coins. Also – the volunteers need to be notified and validate that they will present and be at the meeting.

Step 2: First round, 4 head-to-head contests. In each contest, the presenters make their pitch and then immediately there is a vote with a winner of that contest determined. NOTE: Be prepared for a tie. We used one re-vote and then when there was still a tie, we eliminated the officers' votes. If there is still a tie – you can use a coin flip, or you can use which one had a higher vote count in the ballot process.

Step 3 & 4: Second round and final. Same process except for only the winners from the previous round. You end up with a winner of the Club's most Beautiful Coin.

It is helpful to have handouts to the club membership at the meetings where the voting occurs – one for the bracket and one for pictures of the coins in the contest.

Beware that the first round presentations and voting may take over 30 minutes. This is much longer than the CCCC "normal" presentation of 15 to 20 minutes.

Another caveat – you should plan on a presenter bowing out at the last minute. Have someone ready to jump in and present for any of the coins in the contest.


