

2025 LIBRARY IMPROVEMENT AND ANA SUMMER **SEMINAR GRANTS**

IT'S TIME TO SEND IN YOUR ENTRY FORMS!

Each year, the TNA issues Grants to two qualifying members for tuition, room and board, and travel to the ANA Summer Seminar. TNA also funds five \$125 reimbursement Grants to qualifying members to purchase books and material to improve your numismatic libraries.

Individuals (not clubs) who have been members for two years (and are non-winners for two years) are eligible to enter the drawing for one of two grants to cover transportation, room and board, and tuition at the 2025 ANA Summer Seminar in Colorado Springs.

As has been the case for the last several years, the drawings will likely coincide with the Houston Money Show in mid-January 2025.

Individuals and clubs who have been members for two years (and are non-winners for two years) are eligible to enter the drawing for one of five grants of up to \$125 to improve the member's numismatic library.

Entries will be drawn first for the Summer Seminar, and then for the Library Improvement Grants. A member may only win one grant per year.

Reelection

If you are an incumbent Governor or Officer, you need to notify your intent to run for reelection with the TNA Secretary during the application window (Jan. 1 - April 16).

New Nominees

If you intend to run for a Governor or an Officer position, you need to notify the TNA Secretary during the application window (Jan. 1 - April 16). Please include your name and your desired position title. All nominees must be up-to-date on their membership dues and Governor nominees must live in the District. See details from the TNA bylaws on the following page for additional information.

Promote Your Campaign

You are encouraged to publish a statement giving your biography and promoting your campaign in the TNA News magazine for the December 2024 and March 2025 issues. Contact Ann Marie Avants at the TNA news@gmail.com by October 1 to make it into the December issue. Reach out any time with questions!

Ballots

Ballots will be mailed to all TNA members for state-wide Officer positions or individual districts for Governor positions if two or more people are running for that position. Unopposed races will not be issued ballots. Ballots will be mailed by April 21 and must be returned by May 16, 2025. See the following page for more details.

TNA ELECTION PROCEDURES

The following election procedures are set forth by the TNA Bylaws and the TNA Board. The 2025 election is for Officers and Governors to serve for the two-year period beginning after the end of the 2025 TNA Convention and through the end of the 2027 TNA Convention. The election is by secret ballot.

The five statewide Officers are the President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer. In addition, District Governors are up for election. To run for office, a candidate needs to file for office in writing or electronically directly with the TNA Secretary from January 1, 2025 until April 16, 2025. Section 5.02a of the TNA bylaws: Candidates for office may file for office with the Association's Secretary from the period of one hundred fifty (150) days to forty-five (45) days before the date of the Annual Meeting. A nomination by another member will not be accepted. All candidates for statewide offices must be Texas residents. All candidates for District Governor must reside in the district they are running for with the exception of District 10 where New Mexico residents within 75 miles of the district border are eligible.

All candidates must be members of the TNA at the time they file for office. See Section 2.02 of the TNA bylaws. No member shall be eligible for President until they have served in at least one elected office in the TNA. No President or Vice-President shall serve more than two consecutive terms or partial terms in the same office without a break in service. If a candidate runs for President or Secretary, they cannot run for any other office. Otherwise, candidates can run for multiple offices if the resident restrictions allow.

State Officers are elected by all TNA members. District Governors are elected by TNA members in the respective districts. There is no provision for write-in votes. There is no run-off in the event a candidate does not receive at least fifty-one percent of the votes. The candidate receiving the most votes shall be declared the winner of the election. In the event candidates receive the same number of votes, the winner will be determined by the outgoing Board of Directors.

Ballots shall only be sent to TNA members where there are contested elections. If there is only one candidate for an office, the office shall be deemed uncontested and the Board shall certify that candidate as elected to the office. Ballots will be mailed to TNA members by April 21, 2025 and must be received (not post-marked) by the Secretary by May 16, 2025. Section 5.03c: The Secretary shall be authorized to mail official ballots to members forty (40) days prior to the date of the Annual Meeting. Ballots must be returned and in the Secretary's office fifteen (15) days before the date of the Annual Meeting. Late ballots, altered ballots or ballots suspected of being altered or otherwise tampered with will not be counted.

The results of the election will be announced at the 2025 Annual Meeting of the membership in Arlington, Texas. Section 5.03d: The President shall appoint an Election Committee at least twenty-one (21) days before the date of the Annual Meeting to judge and count the ballots. The Committee shall consist of the Secretary and two (2) other Board Members; however, no Election Committee Member shall be involved in a contested election.

Candidates may submit a biographical sketch, no longer than 150 words, suitable for publication in the TNA News and TNA website. If publishing deadlines allow, candidates names and any biography will be published in the TNA News. The same may be posted on the TNA website. Candidates may purchase appropriate political advertising in the TNA News.

Section 2.02 of the TNA Bylaws provide: A Membership shall be open to all who fulfill the requirements contained herein. An applicant's name shall be published in the official publication of the Association. If no written objections are received by the Secretary by the first day of the next month following publication, the applicant shall be admitted to membership.

PRESIDENT ARTURO ALESSANDRI OF CHILE ON FIFTY ESCUDOS NOTE

To honor Arturo Alessandri's service to Chile, he was featured on the fifty Escudos note from 1962 to 1975 that was issued by the Central Bank of Chile.

The obverse is dark green and olive brown on a multicolor underprint that features a portrait of Arturo Alessandri, a former president of Chile. The reverse is brown and green that features the façade of the Central Bank of Chile located in Santiago. To the left is the Coat of Arms. The watermark is a portrait of D. Diego Portales, a Chilean statesman who died in 1837.

Antonio Fortunato Alessandri Palma, who was born December 20, 1868 and died August 24, 1950, served three times as the President of Chile. The first time was from 1920 to 1924, the second from March to October in 1925, and the third time from 1932 to 1938.

Arturo Alessandri's grandfather immigrated from Italy to South America. At the age of twelve, Arturo enrolled at the Sacred Hearts High School. Where his father and brothers all attended. At the age of twenty, he began studying law at the University of Chile. After graduating in 1893, he married Rosa Ester Rodriguez Velasco, and they had nine children.

His political career began in 1897, and in 1920 was first elected as the President of Chile. There was political upheaval during his times as president, but there were some important accomplishments during his years of service. In his last term he balanced the budget and focused on public works, including the construction of the National Stadium in Santiago.

Arturo Alessandri continued in politics even after serving as President of Chile. He was elected to the Senate and was serving as the President of the Senate at the time of his death at the age of eighty-two. His son, Fernando Alessandri, replaced him in that position. Another of his sons, Jorge Alessandri, also served as the President of Chile from 1958 to 1964.

THE GERMAN HYPERINFLATION Chuck Nail, Gateway Coin Club of San Antonio, Inc.

Soon after the start of World War I, the German people began hoarding silver and gold coins in 1914. Around 1916, nickel and copper minor coins also swiftly disappeared from circulation. In somewhat of a panic situation, at the start of the war emergency currency, Notgeld in German, was printed by a few cities in Germany near the borders of the country. More about emergency money later.

In 1914, one dollar equaled 4.2 gold marks. At the height of the German Hyperinflation in 1924, one dollar equaled 4.2 trillion paper marks! There are two main causes to the Hyperinflation: Imperial Germany's losing the war and the harsh treaty of Versailles that demanded financial restitution amounting to the tune of 132 billion gold marks. This is about \$269 billion in today's money. An interesting side note: ever wonder why the U.S. Peace dollar is called a "peace" dollar with the word "peace" below the eagle on the reverse of the coin? The Peace dollar began mintage in 1921 the same year the Treaty of Versailles was signed formally ending hostilities. I have one in my German collection as it is a part of German American history. It took ninety-two years for Germany to pay off the mandated WW I debt on October 3, 2010.

As Germans have been and still are avid stamp and coin collectors, it only became second nature to start collecting the rapidly devaluing stamps, coins and now paper money issued since 1914. German banknotes could no longer be issued backed by gold; thus, the German Mark name was discontinued, and the new name was German Reichmark. "Reich" is the German word for "Imperial or Empire." This differentiated the former backed by gold and the new currency essentially being backed by nothing more but what the German government could print!

As the inflation grew, the new Reichmark banknotes were physically printed larger and larger in size. Though, ironically, the value of the newly printed notes became increasingly less and less in value than the former Mark notes. As the 1920s began, the quality of the notes declined. Watermarks and security threads were discontinued and eventually notes were only printed on one side. There were stories to describe how little German paper money was becoming. A housewife went shopping at the market, and when she momentarily turned her back, a thief knocked over her basket of Inflation money running off with only the basket! Another time a man was waiting for a table at a café, and the waiter looked down at the man's suitcase and said, "sorry but you cannot bring luggage into the



cafe." The man replied, "This isn't a suitcase but my wallet!"

Drastic measures were also taken by Germany to prevent hoarding of silver coinage before silver coins were

discontinued. In the early years of the war the half-Mark silver coins were blackened to give the appearance of being minted in something other than silver. As early as 1916, towns and cities began issuing minor coins out of zinc and iron. There were also encased postage stamps and even compressed coal dust issues! The odd coal dust issues are quite rare, and I have only seen one in over fifty years of collecting and am very fortunate to own it.

The paper emergency issues from 1914 to 1920 were printed mainly for necessity with a few issues printed with city scenes and various famous Germans throughout history. As early as 1914 German collectors began putting the ever more increasing issues first in photo albums and later special paper money albums became available. Starting in 1921 the collecting of paper commemorative notes really took off. At that time, notes were issued with an expiration date of usually only thirty days after being printed. It was often the case that new issues were held back and not realized to the public until after the date of expiration in order for the printing entity to maximize profits! But this didn't seem to bother the ever-increasing collectors. A set of 1921 series notes were usually between three to six notes. Themes of the notes varied from city scenes through the ages to famous military figures and scenes of the lost German colonies. Anti-Allied propaganda was very common. A common misconception was that Germany only lost the war due to "Jewish bankers." Anti-Semitism was not only present in Germany but throughout Europe. As in any society in times of financial upheaval and war, minorities are made the scape goat.

Not only were notes and coins issued by towns and cities, but there were many curious issues by large private firms. Mercedes-Benz issued a note with the picture depicting a Mercedes-Benz race car of the era. BMW issued a base metal coin with the company's logo. Many restaurants also issued notes. A most interesting emergency coin was issued by the former German colony of German East Africa (today's countries of Tanzania, Rwanda and Burundi). With the outbreak of the war in Europe, the population also started hoarding the circulating silver coins. Since German East Africa had no silver deposits, there could be





no new coins minted. However, the German East African bank had a large supply of gold. Thus in 1916 gold emergency coins of fifteen Rupees that equaled twenty German gold Marks were issued. As far as I have been able to determine, there never has been an emergency coin minted in gold!

In 1923 the final year of the Hyper-Inflation, prices for goods were very, very interesting indeed! My grandfather's Holy communion bible cost 10,000 Reichmark and his suit was 100,000 Reichmark! As the then common practice of bundling inflated notes took off, the notes lost their value and children would use the bundles of banknotes as "building blocks." People would use banknotes for wallpaper. Workers were paid hourly in cash as the rate of exchange became rampant. It was cheaper to burn defunct notes in stoves and home heaters.

What most people don't know is that not all German Hyper-Inflation notes lost their face value. In 1924 before the German government issued the Rentenmark. Translated, this was a new currency based on the value of German land, whose face value had reached the value of "Billionen," German for trillion. From my research I discovered that technically the inflation Reichmark notes dated 1924 that were exchangeable into the new Rentenmark, still can be turned into current German money! But as these notes previously and perhaps still hold face value, the collector value vastly exceeds any exchanged amount.

Though I have been very fortunate to have obtained many interesting and often rare coins and medals from the German Hyperinflation period, the most amazing coin I have is the 1923 Westphalian One Billion Mark gilded coin pictured in this article. In the 1920s many values were issued by Westphalia all with the "prancing horse." The highest denomination was the One Billion coins. The common One Billion was silver plated. However, a rare variety of the Westphalian One Billion coin was gilded. This massive coin is 60 mm across. In all of my over fiftytwo years of collecting, I have seen a few of the silver plated One Billion coins. The gilded variety was available only once and of course I added it to my collection!

FR. JOSE MORELES MEXICAN PATRIOT

This coin features the portrait of the distinguished Mexican patriot, Jose Morelos. He is known as a very skillful strategist and an important hero of the Mexican War of Independence. The Morelos silver coins were minted between 1957-1967 to commemorate the one-hundredth anniversary of the Mexican constitution of 1857. These are the last of Mexico's silver coins, after which the Peso was minted using copper-nickel.

On the obverse is the name of the country, Estados Unidos Mexicanos, in a semicircle over the Mexican coat of arms, which is a Mexican golden eagle standing on a prickly pear cactus devouring a rattlesnake. At the base of the cactus there is a holm oak (encino) branch on one side and a laurel branch on the other. The denomination and year are at the bottom.

The reverse features a portrait of Jose Morales facing to the right. The mint mark MO is to the left of the portrait. There is a lettered edge with the phrase "INDEPENDENCIA Y LIBERTAD" (INDEPENDENCE AND LIBERTY). The coin is 4.5 mm in diameter, 2.3 mm thick, and contains 15.7 grams of silver.

The 1965 one-peso is part of a series of usual circulation coins struck from 1957-1967. Morelos has been portrayed on the fifty-peso since 1997, and on one-peso coins during the 1940s, 1970s and 1980s.

On September 16, 1810, Father Miguel Hidalgo y Costilla, a revolutionary Mexican Catholic priest, rang the church bell from his parish in Dolores



to announce a rebellion against Spanish colonial authorities which led to the Mexican War of Independence. Hidalgo led a large force which was finally defeated at Aculo on November 7, 1810, and at the bridge of Calderón on Río Santiago on January 17, 1811. Hidalgo was later captured and, after being degraded from the priesthood, was shot as a rebel on July 31 or August 1, 1811.

Jose Morales, also a Catholic priest, military leader, and statesman, assumed the command of the Mexican War of Independence (1765-1815) after the execution of Miguel Hidalgo y Costilla in 1811.

While escorting the new insurgent Congress in November 1815, he was defeated in Temalaca by royalist forces. Morelos and his guard were surrounded. He dispersed his troops and was captured alone. As a Catholic priest, the church had jurisdiction for his imprisonment and trial. He was jailed in the Inquisition building in Mexico City. Although Morelos was a huge prize for the royal government, the viceroy decided not to make a public spectacle of his journey of



incarceration, but rather slipped him into the capital before dawn.

The royal government had experience with the trial and execution of Father Miguel Hidalgo y Costilla, which was done far from the capital and in rushed fashion. However, Morelos's trial was conducted in the capital with the highest officials presiding, with the outcome of a guilty verdict and execution by civil officials. Inquisition officials drew up twenty-three charges against Morelos, and following proper procedure, Morelos had a defense attorney, José Quiles. He was charged with treason, disloyalty to the crown, and transgressions in his personal life, namely, sending his natural sons to the United States for an education.

He was tried and sentenced to death for treason. Morelos was executed by firing squad on December 22, 1815, in San Cristóbal Ecatepec. After his death, his lieutenant, Vicente Guerrero, continued the War for Independence. Morelos is considered a national hero of Mexico; the state of Morelos and city of Morelia are named after him.

What did I find in my birdbath?!

Perhaps many of you run across articles, especially on the internet, about people who find old coins in unbelievable places. I do not always believe that people are that lucky and the photos look staged to me. Well, I've got a strange tale to tell you that recently happened to me.

A few days ago, I decided to quit procrastinating and work on my water fountain/birdbath in the backyard. Some of the concrete was cracking and breaking apart so I decided to fix what I could and clean it out while the weather was hot and dry in preparation to add water for the birds and wild critters. I removed the old broken concrete and then I used my leaf blower to clear out the dried algae, dirt, and concrete dust. Upon doing so, I noticed a round, black disc in the bottom section. Thinking it was a plastic cap or a part of the old water pump, I reached to pick up a metal disc that had some hefty weight to it.

Upon closer inspection I saw that the number "40" was stamped in the center of the disc and that it had some faint signs of a design around the number. The disc was the size of a silver dollar but I wasn't sure what I had found. I took the black metal disc inside and soaked it in dishwater liquid for a period of time. Periodically, I would take it out and gently rub the metal disc between my fingers on both sides in hopes to clean off what residue I could. Slowly, more of the design showed up and, more importantly, I discovered that the disc had a reeded edge. I had found a coin!

This mystery coin had a distinctive pattern on each side. It was not magnetic and cleaning definitely revealed sections of exposed copper. I went into research mode to find what kind of coin it was. I was hoping against all odds that I had found a million-dollar rare coin. That was wishful thinking on my part. After I determined that the coin design did not match any early American coin designs. I believed the coin had to be an old foreign copper coin. I searched the internet for a copper coin with the number "40" stamped in the middle. My

search honed in on a Brazilian 80 Reis counterstamped with 40 copper coin.

As the story goes, Brazil was a Portuguese Colonial Province. King Pedro I of Portugal left Brazil to assume the throne in Portugal and left his young son, Pedro II, to become Regent of Brazil. Very soon, Pedro II would become Emperor of the Empire of Brazil



when he declared Brazil an independent nation, that along with a series of unfortunate events would cause an economic crisis in Brazil. In 1835, Brazil devalued its money by 50%: 80 Reis coins were counterstamped with a 40, 40 Reis coins were counterstamped with a 20, 20 Reis coins were counterstamped with a 10, etc. The coin I found was a counterstamped 80 Reis Brazilian coin. Although the lettering, date, and mintmark were not visible, I could at least date the coin to 1835 by the counterstamp.

So the million-dollar coin I found turned out to be not worth much more than copper melt value without a clear date and mintmark on it. But still, think of what this coin endured over the years in my water fountain/birdbath; ice, snow, water, algae, chemicals, and a lot of bird poo too only to find its way, by some strange coincidence, into the possession of an avid coin collector who would appreciate its history.

Well, I guess I now have to include myself into that group of extremely lucky people who somehow find old coins in unbelievable situations. How did a 200-year-old Brazilian coin make a journey thousands of miles away, across two continents and into a birdbath in my backyard in Paris, Texas? I may never know the full story behind this coin but it does make for a good tale to tell. And you know I went back to see if there were more coins in that birdbath. No luck!

ROOSEVELT 2015 P REVERSE PROOF DIME

I acquired a Roosevelt dime at the 2024 TNA Convention in Conroe, Texas, this June. My search for this particular dime has been elusive. It's the 2015 P silver reverse proof Roosevelt dime. This Roosevelt dime is one of the most attractive, and only 74,430 were minted. The obverse has a brilliant portrait of Roosevelt facing left with a frosted background making the Roosevelt portrait stand out with striking beauty. The reverse, which is similar to the obverse, also has a brilliant torch which is flanked by olive and oak branches. All the lettering and numbers also have a dazzling presentation. This silver proof dime is composed of 0.999 silver, 0.100 copper and (net weight of 0.07234 oz. of silver).

The Roosevelt dime is named for Franklin Delano Roosevelt who served as president from March 1933 to April 1945, the longest tenure in American history. He died in 1945 at the age of 53 while serving in office. He was replaced by then Vice President Harry S. Truman. After his death, the United States Treasury rushed to create a coin in his honor. The first Roosevelt dime was minted in 1946. President Roosevelt's personal struggle with polio led to the creation of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, better known as the March of Dimes. President Roosevelt also transformed American society with the New Deal and World War II.





KUWAIT 5 DINARS

Kuwait is a country in West Asia at the tip of the Persian Gulf bordering Iraq to the north and Saudi Arabia to the south. In 2023, the population of Kuwait was 4.82 million. Most of the country's population reside in or near Kuwait City, the capital and largest city.

In August 1990, Iraqi forces invaded and annexed Kuwait without any warning. After a series of failed diplomatic negotiations, the United States led a coalition to remove the Iraqi forces from Kuwait, in what became known as the Gulf War. On February 26, 1991, in phase of code-named Operation Desert Storm, the coalition succeeded in driving out the Iraqi forces.

The Kuwait 5 Dinars was minted by the British Royal Mint in silver (.925) to commemorate the Liberation of Kuwait.

THE HISTORIC AND UNIQUE 1900 LAFAYETTE SILVER DOLLAR COMMEMORATIVE COIN

The first dollar commemorative coin issued in the United States was the Lafayette silver dollar. It was not until 1983 that another dollar commemorative coin was issued for the Los Angeles Olympics. The obverse features the first time a portrait of a U.S. President (George Washington) was placed on a commemorative coin. Washington appears alongside French U.S. Revolutionary War hero, Marquis de Lafayette. The reverse features Lafayette on horseback, riding left with a sword extended upward, symbolizing his readiness to serve the American Colonists in the cause of liberty. The Lafayette coin was authorized by an act of Congress under Public Law 55-188 on March 3, 1899 with the proceeds from its sale (originally \$2.00 per coin) going to support the Lafayette Memorial Commission to help construct a Lafayette memorial in Paris, France. Funds were also collected from students of schools, colleges and universities.

- Lafayette was the first person to appear on both the obverse and reverse of a U.S. Coin.
- All Lafayette dollars were minted in Philadelphia on the same day, December 14, 1899 (the 100-year anniversary of the death of President Washington). The date on the coin is 1900, not for the date minted, but for the year of the Paris World's Exposition and Olympics.
- President William McKinley arranged for the first coin struck to be given to French President Emile Loubet.
- The 1900 Summer Olympics were held within the framework of the Paris Exposition and were the second modern Olympics games held and the first ones held outside Greece. Events such as motorcycle and car racing, croquet, and kite flying were contested for the first and only time in Olympic history. No opening or closing ceremonies were held.

Today we continue to appreciate the important role that General Lafayette played in helping General George Washington and the Continental Army win a decisive victory at Yorktown in 1781 over General Lord Charles Cornwallis and his British troops in the Revolutionary War's last major battle. The French Navy blockaded Chesapeake Bay to prevent the British from getting reinforcements and supplies to Cornwallis and his troops, eventually leading to their surrender. This historic 1900 Lafayette silver dollar became the first commemorative coin issued to help fund a monument.

The coin, designed by Charles Barber, had the following specifications:

- 1. Weight 26.73 grams
- 2. Has a diameter of 38.1 millimeters
- 3. Contains 90% silver and 10% copper
- 4. Reeded Edge
- 5. Mintage 36,026 Coins

Are Classic, Proof Washington Quarters Undervalued?

The United States Mint has pounded out an absolutely torrential flow of quarters in the last twenty-five years, with the reverses changing so often that it sometimes confuses even long-time collectors as to what is most current. The designs are sometimes praised and sometimes reviled. But no matter what, we now see in pocket change some quarters from the States Reverse program, the America the Beautiful program, and now the American Women program. Trying to find in pocket change all the different designs, as well as the different mint marks, can keep a person busy as they build their collection. That in turn can sometimes keep us from looking back at our classic pieces. Let's reverse this a bit, and take a good look at the oldest of our Washington quarters, and at the limited number of proofs scattered among them.

Standing Liberty

Prior to our now well-established Washington quarter, the Mint produced the classic Standing Liberty quarter design from 1916 to 1930. While the design work of Mr. Hermon MacNeil is beautiful, the series is tough to collect. This is largely because from 1916 to 1924, the date was one of the highest points on the obverse and wore off quickly. It's difficult, and expensive, to find attractive pieces that fall in these first nine years of issue.

Another disappointment within the Standing Liberty quarter series is that there were never any proofs produced. Prior to the design, there were a very few coined during the years of the Barber quarters. Yet what is called the modern proof set era gets its start with the Washington quarters. But since there were no proofs during the Standing Liberty years, we may end up having a longing for them, for something that never came to be.

From 1936 to 1942

The year 1932 saw the switch in design to that which honors Mr. Washington, because it was the bicentennial of his birth. There were no proofs issued until 1936, but

> from that year to 1942 there is a small but steadily rising group of proofs of all

> > denominations. In 1936 there were only 3,837 proof quarters produced, which seems absolutely tiny by today's standards. By 1940 though, the

11,246, and this is where we want to pause and take a good look.


That number – meaning 11,246 – is another that probably strikes us as dreadfully low when it comes to any proof coin. For proof Washington quarters, it's probably fair to think that a legion of collectors are aching to get one. This is why we have just mentioned the Standing Liberty quarters, though. Perhaps because their design is the more classic, beautiful one, there doesn't seem to be a great deal of buzz when a 1940 proof Washington quarter is available. A coin we might think will cost tens of thousands of dollars generally lists in the standard references as being about \$150 in a grade as high as PF-65. That is definitely worth considering.

Now, lest we think this number is some typo on one or more of the older lists that still come out in print each month or so, a scroll and stroll through eBay indicates that there are PF-64 and PF-65 proofs from 1940 that ring in at about the same price, \$150. In short, amazing.

The year 1940 was not the last of these earliest proof Washington quarters. In 1941 the Mint upped its output to 15,287 of them. And on top of this, in 1942 the number climbed to 21,123. As noted, both of these numbers are far, far smaller than the number of proofs we are accustomed to today. But as with the 1940 proof, both of these are wonderfully affordable. Something in the range of only \$100 will land either of these dates in a grade such as PF-65. That has to make even the most frugal collector happy.

From 1950 to 1953

Collecting coins most likely took a back seat to plenty of more important activities in 1942, like winning the biggest war the world had ever seen. The end result was a suspension of the proof coin program that extended far beyond the war, to 1949. It was 1950 that saw the resumption, this time with 51,386 proof quarters issued.

Once again, this number of proofs – now proof sets, containing cent, nickel, dime, quarter, and half – is very low when compared to more modern production figures. But it is significantly higher than what came before. And bigger production numbers generally go hand in hand with lower prices. That's what happens here. The 1950 is a 70+ year-old proof that can be had for about \$60 in a grade like PF-65. It can even still be found in grades like PF-67, and at a cost of only about \$125. Once again, amazing.

The numbers of proof sets rose quickly in the 1950's, and 1953 marks the first year for which more than 100,000 proof sets were minted. When it comes to the cost today for a 1953 proof Washington quarter, the \$40 - \$50 we'll have to spend is probably enough to raise the eyebrows of even the most cynical collector, precisely because it is so low.

Beyond this?

After 1953, the cost of just about any proof Washington quarter really bottoms out. The numbers get huge – with more than one million proofs first occurring in 1957 – and the costs flatline at about \$10. Whether all this is simply the result of the big mintages, or if there is still something of a connection to what we perceive of as more attractive Standing Liberty quarters, is hard to tell. But it certainly appears that the classic, proof Washington quarters are a deeply undervalued set.

1) How does a "broadstrike" occur?

The term "broadstrike" has meaning only for coins of the modern minting era in which a collar die is intended to surround the planchet in the press as

the obverse and reverse dies are impressing their images. A broadstrike occurs when the feeder fingers of the press fail to center the incoming planchet in the coining chamber and the collar die does not surround the planchet. The planchet is laying atop the collar (which is spring-mounted to avoid damage to the press) when the obverse and

reverse designs are impressed. A broadstrike coin is thus usually a bit oversize as the edge was not constrained at the moment of striking, and the designs may show weakness near the edge. The centers of the designs are likely to look normal.

2) When did the U.S. Mint first make coins for a foreign country?

The U.S. Mints at Philadelphia, Denver, New Orleans, and San Francisco have executed multiple orders for foreign powers since 1874. But in some obscure papers according to William Bischoff (Coinage of the Americas Conference 1988), the U.S. Mint, including engraver James B. Longacre, did some patterns for Peru in 1855. These patterns were apparently rejected, and no circulation counterparts were ever coined. An example of the pattern is pictured here.









3) When was the first appearance of the motto "E Pluribus Unum" on coins struck for circulation in the United States?

Although the first use of the motto "E Pluribus Unum" ("Out of many, one") on a federal coin was on the Heraldic Eagle Reverse silver dollars of 1798, the first use on a circulating coin came on the New Jersey coppers of 1786. Under the Articles of Confederation, states had the right of copper coinage, and several former colonies issued their own coins until 1789. New Jersey coppers feature a horse head and plow on the obverse and a large shield on the reverse with the motto around it.

4) When did Canada transition to a non-silver circulating coinage?

Canada transitioned to a non-silver circulating coinage at approximately the same time as the U.S. Their pre-1967 10 cents, 25 cents, 50 cents, and dollar were 80% silver, with 0.6 fine ounces per \$1 face. The 10 cents and quarters dated 1967 came in both 80% and 50% silver versions. The 1968 10 cents in silver continued for a small part of the production. The end of silver halves came in 1967. Later pieces of each denomination were steel and nickel, and are magnetic, making them easy to distinguish from the silver ones.

5) What is the "Population Report"?

A "Population Report", such as that issued periodically by PCGS, NGC, and ANACS shows how many grading events have taken place for each coin (by date, mint, variety, etc.) by that firm. Over time, this valuable data has exposed which coins are truly rare and which are more common. But a grading event is a submission which resulted in a slab tag being issued. Thus, it suffers the defect of failing to account for prior submissions of the exact same coin. We know that some coins have been submitted multiple times (after being broken out of their prior slabs) in an effort to "score" an upgrade. Also, there is no accounting in the population reports for coins submitted and rejected for cleaning or other defects in the time period before the slabbing companies began issuing "details" or "qualified" slabs.





6) When were annual 5-coin proof sets first issued by the U.S. Mint?

Annual proof sets made for sale to collectors began with the issues of 1858. Such sets were available for the "minor coins", the "subsidiary coins" (silver), and the gold coins (either singly or in sets). All were priced modestly above face value. They were delivered by mail to collectors requesting that service, or they could be called for personally at the Mint. Issue quantities for the silver sets hovered in the low hundreds for decades, with the "minor sets" somewhat bigger sellers. The proof gold was coined in small numbers, and even so, their high face value meant that many were subsequently spent in everyday trade and have come down to today's collectors in impaired condition.

7) Why are there short threads of red and blue embedded in the paper of our currency?

The tiny red and blue fibers in the paper supplied to the Bureau of Printing and Engraving by Crane Paper Company of Dalton, Massachusetts are an anti-counterfeiting measure. This innovation came very early in Crane's relationship with the Treasury, as far back as the 1860's. Counterfeiters could still print tiny blue and red lines on their bills, but it would require additional steps to do it, and the questionable results would help distinguish them from the genuine notes.

8) Considering areas outside of the 13 original colonies, which ones had their own currency while they were independent countries before becoming U.S. states?

Dr. Coyne can think of three: Hawaii, Texas, and Vermont. Examples pictured here are \$500 from the Hawaiian Islands, \$100 from The Republic of Texas, and \$50 from the State of Vermont.



Since this section of the magazine was established in 2020, the members of this club have faithfully contributed dozens of articles on fascinating specimens from Namibia, Germany, and Mexico, along with information on modern U.S. coins and currency from all eras for collectors at all income levels. The TNA News is proud to highlight diverse voices in the area of numismatics, and the contributions from Gateway Coin Club's members exemplify the TNA's mission to spread educational information to collectors about the coins, currency, tokens, and medals that fill our world. Gateway Coin Club President Frank Galindo accepted the award on behalf of his club.

Program: "Inflationary Currency of Israel, 1980-1985" By: Charlie T. For years before 1980, Israel was frustrated with the Lira since it is also the currency of many other countries, like Italy and Turkey. In 1980, Israel got the chance to replace the Lira with the Shekel, an ancient coin used by their ancestors. Originally, the Shekel was minted in denominations from a one Agora coin (equivalent to 1/100 of a Shekel) to a ½ Shekel coin, and banknotes were issued in denominations from a one Shekel note to a 100 Shegalim note. The early 1980's was denominated by inflation, that affected almost every country What set Israel apart was, in Israel, the inflation did not stop. The bank of Israel had to introduce several new denominations. By 1984, the Bank was issuing 100 Shegalim coins, and 10,000 Shegalim notes. The economic problems faced by Israel in the early 1980s necessitated annual changes in the country's coinage and paper money. These problems continued until the first Shekel series was abandoned in 1985 and replaced with the new Shekel. In 1980, Israel minted the first series of coins using the new Shekel currency. The four denominations 1 Agora, 5 Agorot, 10 Agorot, and ½ Shekel. The 1 Agora and 5 Agorot coins were both made of Aluminum, while the 10 Agorot was made of bronze and the ½ Shekel was made of copper nickel alloy. Other than the ½ Shekel, which was minted by the Swiss mint in Bern, all the new coins were minted by the Royal Canadian Mint in Ottawa. Due to inflation, the Israeli mint began adding the new denominations to the original series, starting with a copper-nickel 1 Shekel coin first issued in 1981. The following year, an aluminumbronze 5 Shegalim coin and a nickel-bronze 10 Shegalim coin were added to the series. Israel continued to contract out the minting of

some of the coins to places like Frankfurt, Paris, and Stuttgart, but others were produced in Jerusalem, such as the ½ Shekel coin starting in 1982. By 1983, it no longer made sense to issue coins in some of the smaller denominations. Two coins—the 1 Agora and the 5 Agorot were omitted from the 1983 series. No new coin denominations were added that year (although the Bank of Israel did begin to print onethousand Shegalim notes). 1983 marked the thirty-fifth anniversary of the State of Israel, and all the coins that year were minted in Jerusalem. Persistent high inflation made further changes necessary. 1984 saw the introduction of an aluminum-bronze 50 Shegalim coin and a nickel-bronze 100 Sheqalim coin, as well as notes of 5,000 and 10,000 Shegalim. The denominations of 1983 continued to be minted in 1984. However, in 1985, all coin denominations of less than 1 Shekel were discontinued. Thus, none of the original coin denominations from 1980 were still being produced at the end of the inflationary period. In 1985, as Israel's inflation reached a peak, it enacted extreme policies that counteracted the inflation. Moreover, in the same year, Israel also switched their currency again to a new Agora and Shekel. These measures started returning the Israeli economy back to an acceptable inflation rate, of 1.3%. These actions were known as the "Economic Stabilization Plan." This plan was a concoction of the new Prime Minister, Shimon Peres. Some have argued that his work may have saved Israel's future entirely. The Story of Israel's economy in the 1980's demonstrates the effects the economic situation of a country has on the coins and banknotes the country produces. Planchets are blank coins and feature a rim but no heads or tails design. Planchets without a rim are considered an error and may be more valuable when found. The creation of a planchet begins with the process of stamping out round pieces of metal from a larger sheet of metal. This is referred to as the "blanking" process. The blanks then got through the "upsetting" machine where the rims are added. At this point, the round pieces are now planchets. The Act of May 16,1866, established the new nickel denomination. The composition of the planchet was 75% copper and 25% nickel. The nickel was difficult to manufacture due to the hardness of the planchets used. The coins struck consistently fell short of the high quality the mint expected and the working dies had a life expectancy far less than predicted. 
APPLICATION
